Ten top tips for reading stories to your child

- 1 Make reading to your child feel like a treat. Introduce each new book with excitement.
- 2 Make it a special quiet time and cuddle up so both of you can see the book.
- 3 Show curiosity in what you're going to read:
 Oh no! I think Arthur is going to get even angrier now.
- A Read the whole story the first time through without stopping too much. If you think your child might not understand something, model an explanation:

 Oh I think what's happening here is that...
- 5 Chat about the story:

 I wonder why he did that?


 Oh no, I hope she's not going to...

 I wouldn't have done that, would you?

- 6 Avoid asking questions to test what your child remembers.
- 7 Link stories to your own experiences (e.g. This reminds me of...)
- 8 Read favourite stories over and over again. Get your child to join in with the bits they know.
- 9 Read with enthusiasm. Don't be embarrassed to try out different voices. Your child will love it.
- 10 Read with enjoyment.



How Henry and Pete continue their feuding adventures makes for more hilarious reading.






The Questing

The Street beneath my Feet by Charlotte Guillian Detailed, ingenious and graphically beautiful this information book opens, as the best do, with an invitation to young readers to stop and wonder as they're asked to think about what is going on beneath their feet. No ordinary book but a fold-out poster in book form, opening out the pages reveals a huge vertical panorama that takes us down through the different layers and right into the very core of the Earth. Friendly but information-rich text explains the features of the different layers, from the pipes and wires that support our civilisation to old bones, underground rivers, coal mines.

The Great Fire of London by Emma Adams

To commemorate the 350th anniversary of the fire, powerful and sumptuous drawings from the new east London illustrator, James Weston Lewis, bring the events of November 1666 to life in this stunning gift book. Lewis's drawings take readers on a journey, from the single smouldering coal that falls out of the baker's oven to the swirling clouds of ash that engulf the city and then in to the very heart of the fire itself.








The Beast of Clawstone Castle By Eva


